2) Story Cards—made similarly to a Collage Card to either illustrate a story or stimulate the writing of a new story.

Those who attended the session in person selected pictures provided along with blank paper, scissors and glue to work with.

Those Zooming in had the option of using either magazines or going on Google for their illustration material.







The Difference Between Line & **Development Editors**

When I tell potential clients that I mainly do developmental editing as opposed to line editing, they often ask what that means. Here are the different types of editors and what they do:

- Developmental editors are concerned with big picture stuff. They work on the plot, characters, and setting of fiction or topic and subtopics in non-fiction. They help develop the manuscript into a more focused and organize story or textbook. They also look closely at point of view and the narrative style. It is sometimes referred to as "content editing" or "substantive editing."
- Line editors are concerned with the work at the sentence and paragraph level. While similar to a proofreader, they not only mark spelling and grammatical errors, they address issues with the use of language. They go beyond "correcting" the piece as an English teacher might, and work on making the language more dynamic and ensuring it flows.

These are the two most common types of freelance editors that authors might consider hiring to prepare their manuscript for submitting to traditional publishing houses or selfpublishing. You should always make sure what service it is you are paying for before hiring any freelancers. This is just as true when dealing with editors as it is with any other private contractor you might hire.
