Kathy asks, "Writing family legacies or just want to polish your research skills for novels and nonfiction books?" Then she says she will "reveal the tools she applied to locate the details that have made her seven books rich in storytelling and fact." She adds, "You will learn how to develop and implement a research plan to improve your story's credibility, how taking a research road trip can enhance your setting and characters, and how to turn dry facts into engaging tales."

Kathy Lynne Marshall is a Diversity and Inclusion Specialist on behalf of our ancestors. She's written seven books that restore the American Historical Record by adding highly-researched, factual accounts of the lives of her European and enslaved African American ancestors. Her latest book is *Finding Marshalls: A Genealogy Trip with a Black & White Twist*.

Kathy also leads workshops to guide others in writing the untold stories of historically excluded individuals. She has delighted audiences at the Afro-American Historical and Genealogical Society conferences, The Sons and Daughters of the United States Middle Passage conference, and local genealogy and writing seminars.
